## THE WAYNE STATE UNIVERSITY STUDENT SENATE ENACT:

**WHEREAS**, the Chaldean-Assyrian population, which includes those of the Assyrian Church of the East, Chaldean Catholic Church, and Syriac Orthodox/Catholic Churches has had a long history in the Metro Detroit community since first arriving in the 1910s, as shown by Wayne State's data metrics from 2004.<sup>1</sup>

**WHEREAS**, Wayne State University has committed in the past to creating meaningful engagement with society, and its mission is to "positively impact local and global community"<sup>2</sup> and,

WHEREAS, President Espy is committed to creating a more equitable society, and our academic community at Wayne State aspires to be a national model in this shared work. Wayne State's Social Justice Action Committee<sup>3</sup> was convened in June 2020 and presented its findings, recommendations, and action steps in March 2021, which are being progressively implemented across campus with the support of the DEI Council.<sup>4</sup>

**WHEREAS**, The Wayne State University Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion mission "recognizes, acknowledges, and affirms the many ways in which people of different backgrounds, identities, and experiences contribute to a rich, vibrant campus community, and creates spaces - physical and virtual - where people see and feel included in and belonging to the Wayne State University community,"<sup>5</sup>

**WHEREAS**, the continuous persecution of Assyrians is in danger of being forgotten due to not being taught at higher levels of education, including the Assyrian genocide, <sup>6</sup> the Simele Massacre<sup>7</sup> (having as of yet been internationally unrecognized by any United Nations member state), and recent events involving ISIS and Kurdish oppression.

**WHEREAS**, the history of the Chaldean-Assyrian population comprises a lengthy period, going back to the ancient Assyrian empires, to the rise of Syriac Christianity, to the present-day persecution they face and their exodus into the diaspora, and deserves to be taught considering the population of the community that attends Wayne State University.

**RESOLVED**, that Wayne State University, should they be unable to put out a statement recognizing prior genocides of the Assyrians, that they instead invest resources into creating a course on genocides that can be incorporated into History and other applicable departments.

**RESOLVED**, that we ask the Departments of History, Anthropology, and Classical and Modern Languages (with its additional Near Eastern Studies department) to invest in educational resources teaching modern Suraye<sup>8</sup> history and identity in their West Asian (Middle Eastern) curriculum.

**RESOLVED**, that Wayne State University recognizes the Chaldean-Assyrians of Metro Detroit, with differing Church affiliations of the Assyrian Church of the East, Chaldean Catholic Church, and Syriac Orthodox/Catholic Churches as a separate ethnicity from their Arab counterparts while continuing to respect both their individual identities and religious freedoms.

**RESOLVED**, that Wayne State University acknowledges the tremendous impact that the Chaldean-Assyrian population of Metro Detroit has had and will continue to have on their heterogeneous student body.
