Resolution 2324-21

A resolution to support the addition of Neo-Aramaic (Sureth/Turoyo) language offerings at Wayne State University within the college of Liberal Arts and Science.

- **WHEREAS**, the Chaldean-Assyrian population, which includes those of the Assyrian Church of the East, Chaldean Catholic Church, and Syriac Orthodox/Catholic Churches has had a long history in the Metro Detroit community since first arriving in the 1910s, as shown by Wayne State's data metrics from 2004.¹
- **WHEREAS**, Wayne State University has committed in the past to creating meaningful engagement with society, and its mission is to "positively impact local and global community" and,
- **WHEREAS**, President Espy is committed to creating a more equitable society, and our academic community at Wayne State aspires to be a national model in this shared work. Wayne State's Social Justice Action Committee³ was convened in June 2020 and

presented its findings, recommendations, and action steps in March 2021, which are being progressively implemented across campus with the support of the DEI Council.⁴

- **WHEREAS**, The Wayne State University Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion mission "recognizes, acknowledges, and affirms the many ways in which people of different backgrounds, identities, and experiences contribute to a rich, vibrant campus community, and creates spaces physical and virtual where people see and feel included in and belonging to the Wayne State University community,"⁵
- WHEREAS, The Neo-Aramaic language (Sureth), which contains influence from Akkadian, Classical Aramaic, and has served as the backbone for modern Semitic languages, is currently classified as "Definitely Endangered" by UNESCO. A language is classified as "Definitely Endangered" when children of native speakers no longer learn the language as their first, which has been a common pattern amongst the Chaldean-Assyrian community here in Metro Detroit.
- **WHEREAS**, a petition released among Wayne State students as of the Winter 2024 semester has accrued 300+ signatures as of today, 3/21/2024, with signatories who are all in support of the initiative.⁶
- **RESOLVED**, that we ask the Departments of Linguistics, Classical and Modern Languages, and departments with other applicable classes to invest in educational resources establishing the teaching of Neo-Aramaic in both the Sureth/Turoyo dialects and their distinct cultures and changing courses where the topic may be incorporated.
- **RESOLVED**, that Wayne State University acknowledges the tremendous impact that the Chaldean-Assyrian population of Metro Detroit has had and will continue to have on their heterogeneous student body.
- **THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED,** the Wayne State University Student Senate will circulate this final resolution to all relevant outlets, including the University President, Provost & Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs, Board of Governors, the University Leadership Council, and the South End.
